Anfonwyd tri o'r dosparth uchaf Cymraeg i gynrychioli'r Ysgol gyda Mr. J. R. Williams, B.A. Pwrpas y gwahoddiad oedd dangos i bobl ieuanc Cymru beth oedd Undeb Cymru Fydd yn ei wneud er mwyn y genedl, ei gwasanaeth ai hyd y blynyddoedd er mwyn meithrin iaith a diwylliant Cymru.

Yn y Gynhadledd yr oedd yr awyrgylch yn selog iawn; teimlwn fod ganddynt achos Cymru yn ddwfn yn eu calonnau.

Cawsom olau ar waith Undeb Cymru Fydd yn araith y Llywydd, sef y Parchedig D. Wyre Lewis, ac araith yr Ysgrifennydd, Mr. T. E. Ellis. Argraffwyd arnom ymdrechion yr adrannau i gael gan yr Awdurdodau Lleol sefydlu Ysgol Gymraeg er mwyn sicrhau y lle priodol i iaith a diwylliant Cymru yn yr ysgolion. Hefyd gwaith pwysig Cyd-bwyllgor Uudeb Cymru Fydd a'r Eglwysi ymhlith Merched Cymru sydd ar wasgar yn Lloegr yw rhoddi cymorth tra gwerthfawr i'r merched alltud hyn. Teimlid y dylid cael Corfforaeth Ddarlledu annibynnol i Gymru, a siaradodd rhai yn selog iawn drosto yn arbennig y Cynghorydd Leti Hopkin, Llanelli. 'Rwy'n sicr bod clustiau yr Arglwydd Brabazon yn llosgi ar y pryd, ac y byddai'n ddrwg ganddo iddo ddweud na allai oddef y Gymraeg ar y radio am ddeng munud, a bod yr amser a gaent yn ormod yn barod. Soniodd Mrs. Hopkins am un tro pan oedd hi yn barod i fynd ar y trên i Gaerdydd i ddarlledu am yr Ysgol Gymraeg a sefydlir yn Llanelli. NOTES ON THIS YEAR'S CHRISTMAS CARD.

This year's Christmas Card design is so far removed from the traditional, that a few words of explanation may be welcome, and of particular interest to those boys who take Art at the School.

To begin with—there is no insistence upon realism of appearance. The design is treated in a stylised manner, the emphasis being laid on pattern in black and white rather on naturalistic effects. Hence the convention of perspective is deliberately eliminated, so as to preserve a flat appearance, tapestry-like in richness. Whether it has been achieved is for you to decide. The surfaces of buildings, walls, foreground, sky and the boys' clothing are broken up into a variety of textures (laid on with pen and brush) in order to obtain a more interesting and rich effect. The windows in the buildings are treated as pure "all-over" pattern, white shapes being laid on black, black shapes on white.


There is much in the composition which is symbolic rather than representational. On the left-hand side War is still taking its deadly toll. There will be critics who will immediately ask "Why introduce War into a Christmas Card?" To these I would say that it is now during the peace and goodwill of Christmas that many of us most vividly remember the horror of that which we have just survived; and during the war years we thought of peace—and especially the peace of Christmas—with longing. Yet even now, so soon after, when the hideous effects of war still lie around us, the world is beginning to forget how near it was to complete destruction. Since the future peace of the world may lie in the hands of the schoolboys of to-day, this card with its message is directed towards you.

To return to the design of the card; out of the smoke and flames of war which writhe like the evil tentacles of an octopus intent on devouring human life, comes The Hand, tortured yet deliberate, and pointing the way to Lasting Peace, which is symbolised on the right-hand side of the composition by The Star. Against this radiance the angry flames compete in vain. Then, centrally placed, march the boys, heeding the direction of The Hand, and moving forward with purpose. The road which they take towards Peace is uphill and stony, but near The Star, the ground shows more evidence of life and growth, and there is a hint that not far ahead the fruits of peace may be waiting.

The caption beneath the picture speaks for itself. This card, then, brings you greetings and a sterner message. Let us not bring down upon ourselves again the unspeakable holocaust of War!

Glynne Jones, who has just been awarded one of the Rockefeller Atlantic Literary Awards, granted to promising young writers whose careers have been affected adversely by the War.

In the realm of sport we heartily congratulate Owen Jones (1938), a former Captain of School 1st XV., who, after playing regularly for the London Welsh was selected, immediately after his call up, to play in the Army trial games against the B.A.O.R. In this match, Wyn Lewis (1935) played for B.A.O.R., and scored a try.

We congratulate Kenneth S. Rees (1942) on being short-listed with one other boy, for the one Sea Cadet to represent Wales on the forthcoming South African tour of the King and Queen. We all hope Kenneth will be the lucky choice.

The O.B.U. was also represented in the National Eisteddfod last August, when Douglas Jones (1940) won the Prize for Impromptu Composition at the age of 17, while Vernon Morris (1937) was the violinist in the winning Trio.

Rev. Royston Beynon (1919) has just been appointed Archdeacon of Northern India with a district as large as Europe to supervise.

It is particularly gratifying to note that the above successes cover a period of overy thirty years, a good indication of the soundness of the Old School.
