The 1970 school play which appeared too late for comment in the last school magazine was "Oliver!" produced by Mr. Myrddin Rees with Mr. Penri Williams as Musical Director. The first musical the Drama Society has ever attempted, "Oliver!" was a runaway success. The next school play, preparations for which are already well under way, will be "A Man for All Seasons"; it will be produced in the 1972 Spring Term.

At the end of the 1970 Christmas term was held a Sixth Form Concert; this was so successful that another more ambitious concern, incorporating acts from both the Boys' and Girls' Grammar Schools will be held during the last week of term. It is intended to hold three performances; one for each of the schools, with a third in public.

A welcome innovation, introduced last January, was the school hot drinks machine.

It has helped considerably to fill the void left by the tuck shop's closure.

Last December a party of boys from School left for Einsiedeln, Switzerland, on the County Skiing Trip. They were led by Mr. Price, Mr. Harry Thomas and Mr. John Rees.

On March 1st was held an Eisteddfod to celebrate St. David's Day, its format

being broadly based on the earlier Christmas Concert.

This year it was found necessary to place a guard on the bike shed, and we would like to thank Richard John and his band of volunteers who have performed this task admirably.

At this year's Speech Day on April 7th, the Guest Speaker was Professor John

Thomas, Head of the Chemistry Department of Aberystwyth University.

Four trophies were stolen from School on May 17th. They were found in Stradey Woods during the summer holidays and have since been returned to the display case.

Adrian Summers, now of 3J, took part as a soloist in a programme from Pembroke

Castle in the series "Music from the Castles," on B.B.C. Television.

During the summer holidays a large party from School, accompanied by Messrs. Gwyn Anthony, Alan Jones, Harry Thomas and Victor Rees, left on a Schools' Mediterranean Cruise aboard the Educational Cruise Ship H.M.S. "Uganda."

The School Parents' Association officially presented the new Ford Minibus (which they had been collecting for since last year) on 21st September. The ceremony was televised by B.B.C. This term the 'bus has already proved tremendously useful and it is

hoped that it will continue to run successfully for many years to come.

At the beginning of this term, the 6A English group accompanied by Mr. Darby and Mr. Davies, visited Stratford-upon-Avon to see "Othello" and "Much Ado About Nothing." The trip, like last year's, was very popular, and it is now hoped to make the visit an annual event.

SPEECH DAY '71

The speaker at this year's speech day which was held in the School Hall on Wednesday, 7th April, was Professor J. M. Thomas, Ph.D., D.Sc., Head of the Chemistry Department, University College of Wales, Aberystwyth.

After the opening address by the Chairman of the School Governors, Alderman D. J. Stone, the Headmaster gave his traditional report on all aspects of school life over

the past year.

The prizes were then presented by the Mayoress, Mrs. Mathonwy Jones, kindly deputising for Mrs. J. M. Thomas who, unfortunately, was unable to attend owing to illness.

A choral item, "Jonah and the Whale," which was enthusiastically received, followed the presentation.

Professor Thomas in his address examined the distractions with which the present day school pupil is surrounded, distractions which serve to prevent them obtaining full benefit from their education. In particular he cited as examples the modern media, which, while they should be enjoyed for relaxation by pupils, should not be the object of over-indulgence.

In composing his address Professor Thomas had obviously placed himself in the position of the pupil with the result that his views were of great interest to his audience

and were well received.

Votes of thanks were proposed to Professor Thomas, Alderman Stone and Mrs. Mathonwy Jones by the head boy, Emyr Evans and his two deputies, Roger Smith and Stuart Blackmore.



LLANELLI VOLUNTEER SERVICE, 1971-72

The Llanelli Volunteer Service was established last December following a meeting held in the Girls' Grammar School, where, after an address made by Mr. Jack Spence of the Swansea Volunteer Service it was decided to form a Llanelli branch of the organisation:—the aim being basically to provide help for those people in genuine need.

Since those early days the Volunteer Service has progressed tremendously, despite the fact that it has seen the departure of its original founder and co-ordinator—Mrs. J. Elliston. Under the leadership of Mrs. Elliston, numerous projects were undertaken: a party of under-privileged children was taken to a pantomime; house cleaning and painting; provision of furniture, carpets and coal for people in need, regular visits to Bryntirion, and various groups visiting housebound people.

In addition to this an 'Afternoon School' was held during April, where members were provided with an opportunity to discuss problems which they had encountered, and discussion groups were formed to study various hypothetical problem cases, after which

conclusions were obtained—it was indeed an undoubted success.

Later in the month, a Jumble Sale was held in Park Church Hall, the proceeds of which were to go towards a Christmas outing for deprived children. The sale was a great success, gaining £40 for the society funds.

In May, members visited Keenan's Scrapyard for their arranged 'Woodchopping Project,' the firewood later being distributed amongst a number of housebound old

people in the Llanelli area.

Following a lapse due to the summer vacation the L.V.S. restarted under the leader-ship of a new co-ordinator, Mr. Alun Williams. Under his supervision, another wood-chopping project was arranged for September, and in October members undertook to clear some of the undergrowth from part of Bryn Chapel Cemetery—this again was well supported. Members also helped the Llanelli Old Peoples' Welfare Committee by collecting £56 for their flag day. Later in the month, during the half-term vacation, members undertook their biggest job 'en masse,' decorating the Headquarters of the Disabled Drivers' Association in Albert Street which lasted the whole of the holiday.

Many other projects have been arranged for the coming months. Now that the weather is becoming colder, it is hoped to have at least one more wood chopping project before the year ends and members intend assisting the Meals on Wheels Association with the distribution of food to the house bound old people in the Llanelli area.

All that remains now, is for me to thank Mr. Alan Williams for his support and for the way in which he has so willingly accepted the responsibilities, as co-ordinator of the L.V.S. and to look forward to another successful year.


