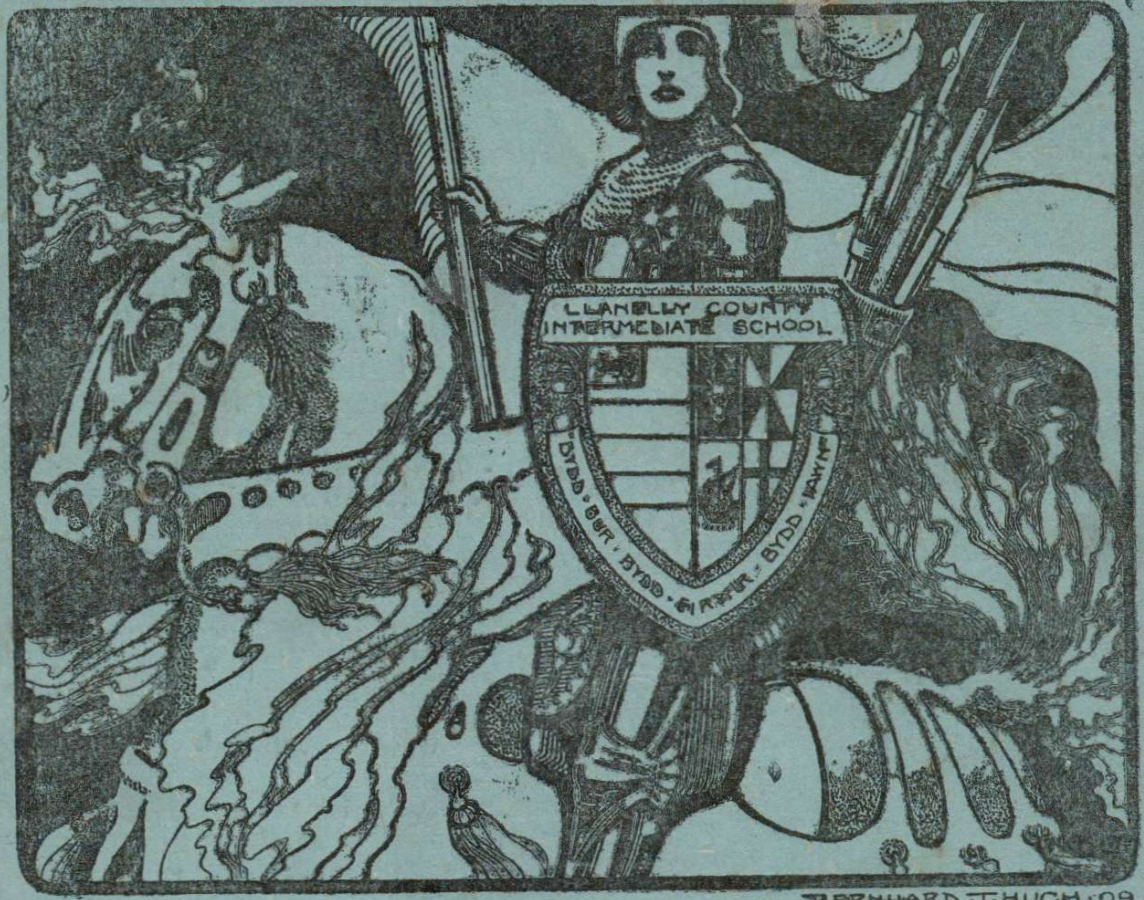

The result of last Term's Old Boys Cricket match was a win for School. The captain of the Old Boys' team this year was Owen Jones.

With pleasure we record the fact that an Old Boy of the School, Mr B. Ward Phillips, has written three short plays which he produced at the Brodie Hall on December 4th and 5th, in aid of the Old Boys' Fund.

The Army Cadets and A.T.C. both had their usual summer camps this year. The Army Cadets went to a camp just outside Chepstow, and thoroughly enjoyed themselves. The A.T.C. were divided into two camps. One group went to Carew Aerodrome in Pembrokeshire, while the other group went to St. Athans Aerodrome.

During the term the School was visited by Miss Payn, of the Ministry of Labour, Cardiff. She gave a lecture to all Senior boys on the interesting topic of "Careers." Miss Payn is a member of the North and South Wales Secondary Schools Advisory Committee.

We should like to congratulate Glyn Price and Peter Lewis of our School Rugby XV. on being chosen for the third Welsh Secondary Schools trial match which was played at Pontypridd on December 15th.

Our new School Society, the Harrier Club, is progressing favourably. Up to going to press, they have run against teams from Trinity College, Carmarthen, and Bridgend County School, winning both events.

With pleasure we record the formation this term of a branch of the Students' Christian Union in School.

Ar Hydref 10, cynhaliwyd canmlwyddiant geni Dr. Timothy Richard. Ef oedd y cenhadwr mwyaf a roddodd Cymru i'r byd. Ei faes cenhadol oedd China, a bu'n gweithio'n ddiwyd yno am lawer o flynyddoedd, er cael llawer o galedi a gwrthwynebiad. Y mae'r Chineaid yn ddyledus iddo am eu deffroad meddyliol a'u rhyddid ysbrydol.

Trefnwyd i ryw ddeugain o fechgyn dosbarthiadau Cymraeg yr Ysgol fyned i'r cyrddau canmlwyddiant, o dan ofal Mr. Huw Roberts, Mr J. R. Williams a Mr. Haydn Jones. Cychwynasom o'r Ysgol tua chwarter wedi naw yn y bore. Yr oedd yn fore braf, a phawb mewn ysbryd uchel. Cymerodd y daith i Gaio ddwy awr, ac yr oedd yn ddifyrrus iawn i weld y wlad o'r bws. Aethom drwy Lannon, Penygroes, Llandeilo, Phumpsaint. Ar y ffordd cawsom gipolwg ar gestyll Carreg Cennen a Dynefor. Wrth nesau at Gaio, yr oedd y tai a'r ffermydd yn fwy gwasgaredig.

Wedyn, aethom i ffermyd Tan-yr-Esgair, lle y magwyd Timothy Richard. Siaradodd cenhadwr arall o China yma, ac wedyn aethom yn ôl i'r bws i gael cinio.

Ar ôl cinio, ymwelsom â'r fan lle y bedyddiwyd Timothy Richard—afon fach a phont yn ei chroesi, a ffermyd yn agos. Siaradwyd yma gan weinidog Salem, Caio, y Parch. Rufus Rogers, B.A. Rhoddodd hanes bedydd Timothy Richard. Siaradwyd hefyd gan y Parch. W. R. Watkin, M.A., Llanelli. Dyma'r unig ddau â siaradodd yn Gymraeg. Siaradwyd gan lawer o ddynion eraill, yn Saesneg. Yn wir, siomwyd ni yn fawr, am ein bod wedi meddwl cael cyrddau hollol Gymraeg.

Wedi bod yma, aethom i gapel arall, lle yr âi Timothy Richard yn ieuanc. Erbyn cyrraedd y capel, yr oedd yn orlawn, a methodd llawer ohonom gael mynediad i mewn. Felly, buom yn ein diffyrru ein hunain am ychydig oriau, ac wedi cael tê, cychwynasom ar ein ffordd adref.

Further outlet for the undoubted ability of our School Athletes has been provided by the formation this winter of a Harrier Club.

Membership of the newly-formed Club has been phenomenal—the first run attracting over a hundred boys. Enthusiasm has waned a little, some of the original runners discovering they did not possess the essential qualities required for this arduous sport—strength, endurance and tenacity.

We have still to meet other opponents on our own Course, a stiff one of 5 miles, but feel very confident of the result of our first tests. V. Griffiths has covered the course in 28½ mins. and G. Bowen (Junior Captain) in 31 mins.

SCIENCE CLUB.

Three meetings of the Science Club have been held this term.

The first was held on October 3rd. It took the form of a "Brains Trust. The "Brains" were supplied by the following: R. Howells, H. Griffiths, A. Stallard, A. Evans, E. Trump and J. Howells. The Brains Trust was controlled by the Question Master, Colin Rees. A number of questions were submitted by the boys, both Senior and Junior, which caused heated arguments among the members of the Trust. Some of these questions were: "Should interplanetary communications be established whenever possible?" "What is Life?" "Which country has produced the greatest Scientists?" "Is there a limit to the speed of an object?" "Should insane people be exterminated?" and others which proved equally difficult. The question of the Atomic Bomb secret caused a division of opinion, and had it not been for the Question Master the debate would have continued all night. There were fifty boys present.

The second meeting was held on November 5th, when Mr. Humphreys gave a lecture for Senior boys only, on "The Science of Atomic Energy." Mr. Humphreys dealt fully with the structure of the atom, and its application to Atomic Energy. He revealed many interesting facts on the amazing amount of energy produced in this manner:—

(1) One pound of Uranium 235 in the atomic bomb releases as much energy as from 8,000 tons of T.N.T., whilst a temperature of several million degrees is reached.

(2) A pin travelling at the speed of particles in the atomic bomb would be able to do as much damage as five fully loaded express trains travelling at 60 m.p.h.

Full use was made of the epidiascope to illustrate various points of interest.

Mr. Humphreys also described how industrial peacetime enterprises would have only a small plant for producing all the energy required for the working of the machinery. He also

showed how this atomic energy could be used as fuel in ships, engines, and other mechanical constructions.

The third meeting was on November 19th. This was the highlight of the term's meetings. It was given to Junior boys only, when "A demonstration on the General Dissection of the Frog" took place. H. Davies, E. Trump, W. Stephens, R. Howells and J. Howells each dissected a frog, with an audience of about twelve boys each. This proved a great attraction for the boys. They were eager to see all they could, and looked on in awe as the dissectors pointed out several interesting features. There were over sixty boys present.

It is hoped that other meetings will be held before the term closes, including evening astronomical observations using the 3in. refracting telescope.

OLD BOYS' UNION.

A MOST memorable year is drawing to its close—the Victory Year, which is also the Jubilee Year of our School, and our first Peace-time Christmas for six years, is at hand. While we all rejoice at the coming of Peace, we must remember the price at which it has been bought, and our first solemn duty is to pay tribute to those who have paid the Supreme Sacrifice, and especially to those our own comrades, before whose names there appears the sacred sign of the Cross in our Roll of Honour.

“Mewn anghof ni chant fod.”

A number of Old Boys have gained decorations and distinctions during the past year. The list appended may, perhaps, be incomplete, but it incorporates all information which has reached us at the time of going to press:—

Lieut-Col. Rev. D. M. Price, C.F., O.B.E (1926) (for gallantry in Italy); Lieut.-Col. Wilfred Miron, M.B.E (1924) (gallant and distinguished service in Burma); Major R. G. T. (Dick) Evans, M.B.E. (1924) (for special services in preparations for the invasion of Normandy); S/Ld. James (Jim) Evans (1928) (mentioned in Dispatches); Rev. Myer Berman, C.F., M.B.E. (gallant and distinguished service); F/O Hubert (Hugh) Rees, D.F.C. (1937), (for gallantry in a raid on Germany in which he was taken prisoner); F/O Stephen E. Evans, D.F.C. (1930).

An outstanding achievement is that of Major F. Elwyn Jones (1921), who was elected M.P. for Plaistow in the recent General Election. We believe him to be the first Old Boy to gain this high distinction. In addition he has gained the signal honour of being chosen as Junior Counsel in the great trial of the War Criminals now proceeding at Nuremberg.

Another Old Boy of some forty years ago, Aelwyn Williams, late of Burry Port, and now holding a high position in the Indian Civil Service has been made a Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George.

Another Old Boy from Burry Port, Dr. Edwards, of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons, lately received much publicity for his great researches in that form of cattle disease described in the Bible among the Plagues of Egypt as “Murrain of the cattle.”

D. Arfon Roberts (1919) has also been recently appointed one of His Majesty's Inspectors of Schools.

Coming to more recent years we note with pleasure the performance of Hugh Davies (1937) in gaining the top place in the

2nd M.B. Examination of London University last summer, for which he was awarded the University Prize in Anatomy. Another fine performance was that of Garvin Collins (1937), who in the same examination, gained the highest place in Physiology, at the age of eighteen. A similar fine achievement was that of R. Ernest Morris (1938), who gained the top place in the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons First Year Examination last July. We also congratulate Owen Jones (1938) on being selected to play for the London Welsh.

In the civic sphere we are pleased to note that the School is well represented. Dr. Harry Llewellyn besides being the first Old Boy to become a Justice of the Peace, has now acquired the further distinction of being elevated to the rank of Alderman on our Borough Council. Another Old Boy, Reginald (Reggie) John, B.Sc., who is Headmaster of Lakefield Secondary (Modern) School, was elected top of the poll in his Ward, as a member of the Borough Council in the recent municipal election.

In congratulating all the above-mentioned, we would draw attention to the fact that something like forty years are covered, including all three Headmasterships, carrying on our tradition of sound scholarship down to the present time—a source of inspiration to those who will come after.

Two at least, of our Old Boys, are making a name for themselves in the realm of literature, one as a dramatist, Brinley Ward Phillips (1918), and the other, W. Glynne Jones (1920), as a writer of short stories, and, in particular, of books for boys. Both work under great physical disadvantages, and command the sympathetic admiration of those who know them. Brin. Phillips has most kindly produced three of his own one-act plays and given all profits to the Funds of the O.B.U. We thank him very sincerely for this generous gesture.

It would be most incomplete to end these notes without reference to one of the most respected of all our Old Boys—T. Campbell James, D.Sc. (1895). After a long and distinguished career as Professor of Chemistry and, later, Vice-Principal of Aberystwyth University College, he has retired from active service in the cause of education. It is with the greatest pleasure, however, that we learn he will still reside at Aberystwyth, where he has promised to continue to give his paternal interest and help to all Llanelly Boys and Girls who come up to the College. He will also, of course, remain President of the Aberystwyth Branch of the O.B.U.—an office which we earnestly hope he may hold for many years of peaceful and happy retirement.

One last note—purely of a begging nature. Will all Old Boys please rally round and help to reach the £1,000 target required

for our University Scholarship? Over £500 has already been subscribed and duly invested.
